

But in spite of her indomitable spirit, this final cancer was merciless, inescapable.</p> <p>At her service, people used the same words to describe her: happy, always positive, always caring. Even when she was so ill. She was a dentist and loved helping people.</p> <p>She loved her family and friends and had a special place in her heart for dogs, volunteering to find them foster homes.</p> <p>The hearing loss was difficult for her, which is no surprise to us. It affected her relationships, her work, her hopes for finding her soul mate.</p> <p>She had a cochlear implant but her anatomy caused problems and she was re-implanted in a long, treacherous operation as the surgeon struggled to drill deep enough to find her cochlea. It was during this time she found the lump behind her other ear.</p> <p>It is humbling to think of what she endured. She was a role model for making the most of life, loving life, dealing with each adversity with grace and courage.</p> <p>Julia, you died too young, I am one of many who will never forget you.</p> <p>For Whom The Bell Tolls by John Donne</p> <p>No man is an island, Entire of itself. Last month, Joan Padilla, Corrine Brown and Susan Almond attended an HLAA booth at this health fair. Below is a report.

Joan Padilla: "The Cochlear Hearing Health Seminar went very well. We spoke to several people who are isolated due to their hearing loss. I stressed the importance of our HLAA group and invited many to attend our meetings. We had some returning back to our booth saying they will come. Also, spoke to Dr. Holtel and his audiologists from Sharp Rees-Stealy Medical Center. They requested our information to give to patients and acknowledged the importance of our group. The set up was over the top and spoke with several other participants. Provided were Starbucks coffee, bagels, juices, fruits, etc.... :) The Cochlear staff was wonderful and very easy to speak to. I was totally amazed and recommend we participate again if we are asked."

Corrine Brown: "I agree with what Joan said - it was a great way to spread the word about our organization. Because there were three of us, we could wander to other booths and mention our organization in conversation too. I had a chance to tell people about my experience of learning about neckloops from HLAA meetings and even show several people how they can be used with phones at the CTAP booth and show them my Pocket Talker (handing them Hear Gear flyers of course as a resource to purchase Pocket Talkers and other assistive listening equipment).
